



Mary Ferrar was born 19 January 1775 in Limerick, Ireland. She married William Augustus Minchin in 1796 and ad eight children. She died on 19 May 1809 and is buried at New Ross Parish Church.

Her brother, William Hugh Ferrar was born 1771 in Limerick. He married Maria Lloyd in 1790 and had 10 children. He died on 26 December 1826.





Michael Lloyd Ferrar was the 6th child of William and Maria Ferrar. He was born on 14 December 1799 in Dublin.

After a ten year engagement, he married his first cousin, Mary Minchin, (the 2nd child of William and Mary Minchin) on 19 September 1834 in Taney Church, Dublin.

They had nine children. He died on 27 February 1884 in Belfast.

Their first child was William Hugh Ferrar (1835-1871)

He married Elizabeth Banks in September 1859.



He was a Professor of Latin at Trinity College, Dublin. He was sent on a sea voyage to Australia to treat his tuberculosis, but died one month after arriving in Sidney.

They had four children: Mary Howard (1857-1925), Benjamin Banks (1862-1948), Anne Josephine (1864-1941) and Elizabeth Margaret (1869-1939)

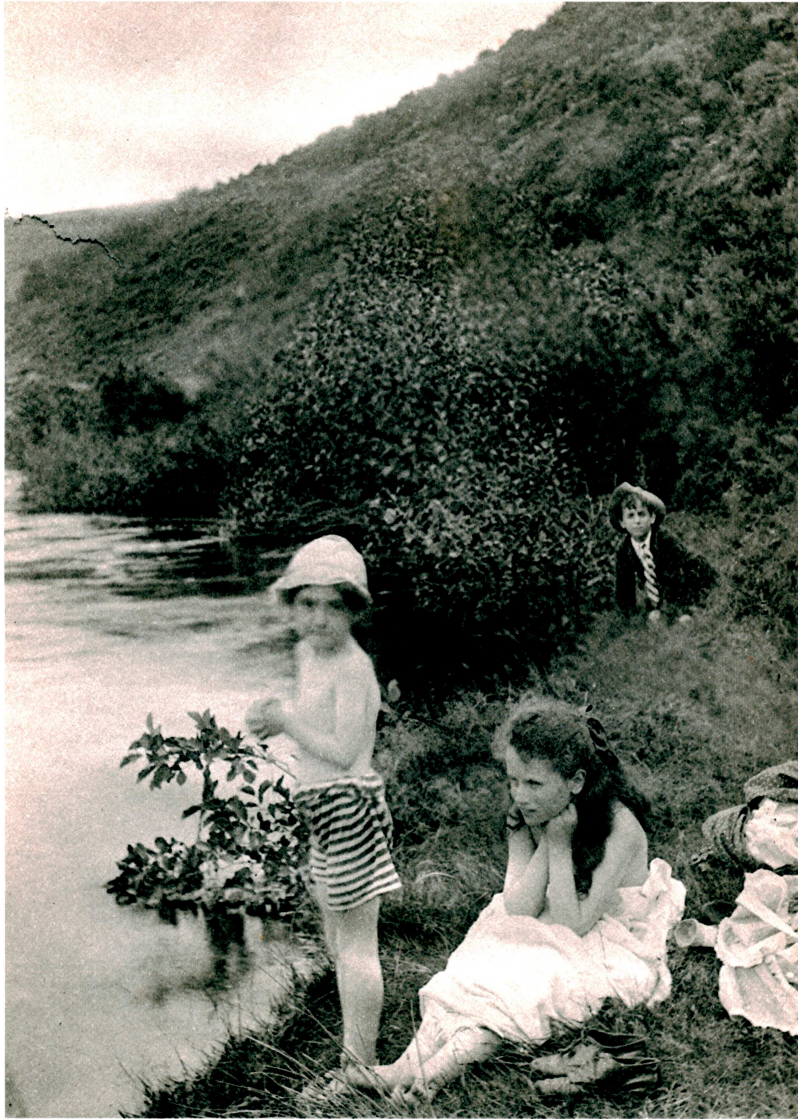

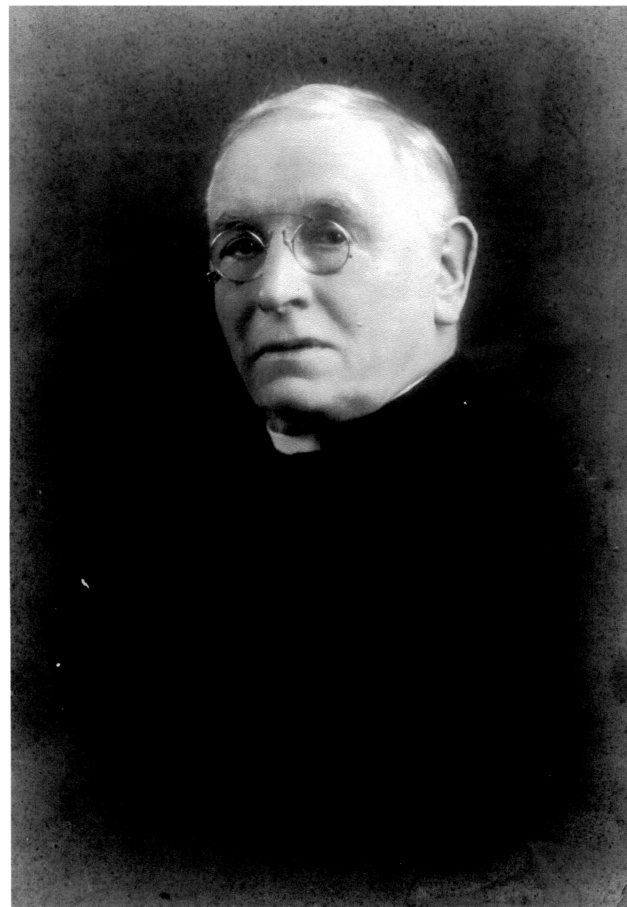
### ST. ANN'S VICARS 1902-1922

John was in charge of the parish of Harold's Cross, Dublin, 1883-1888; Vicar of Christ Church, Kingstown (now Dun Laoghaire) 1888-1902; Rector of St. Anne's Church, Dublin 1902 - 1907. During this time he was chaplain to the Viceroy of Ireland and Professor of Pastoral Theology in Trinity College, Dublin.

In 1907 he moved his family to Montreal, Canada, where he became the Rector of St. George's Church, Dominion Square (Place du Canada).





H.A. Wilson worked at the Cavendish Laboratory in Cambridge from 1897 through 1904.

H.A. furthered the work of C.T.R. Wilson and J.S. Townshend on cloud chambers. Drops of water can be made to form on electrically charged particles. H.A. measured the rate of fall of these drops with and without a vertical electric field. Robert Millikan modified this technique to determine the charge carried by an electron (for which he earned the Nobel Prize).

H.A.'s other area of research was on the electrical conductivity of flames.





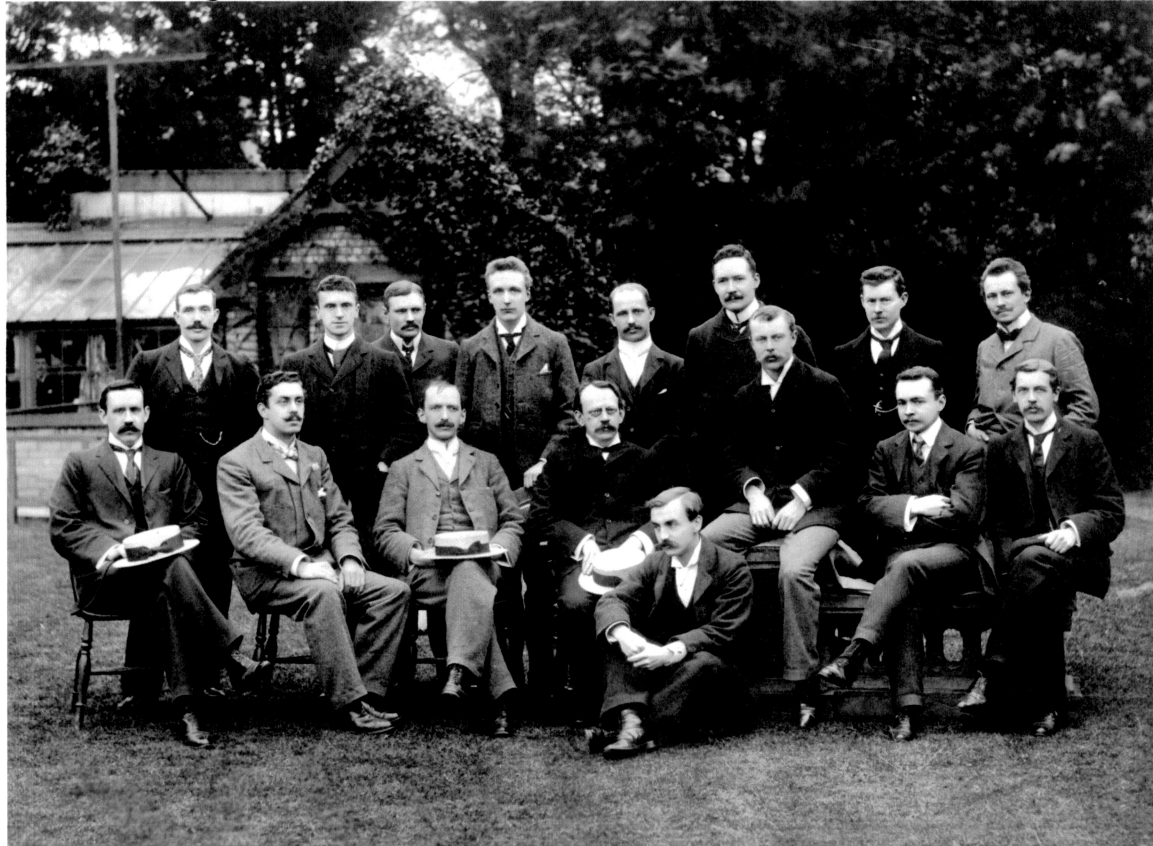

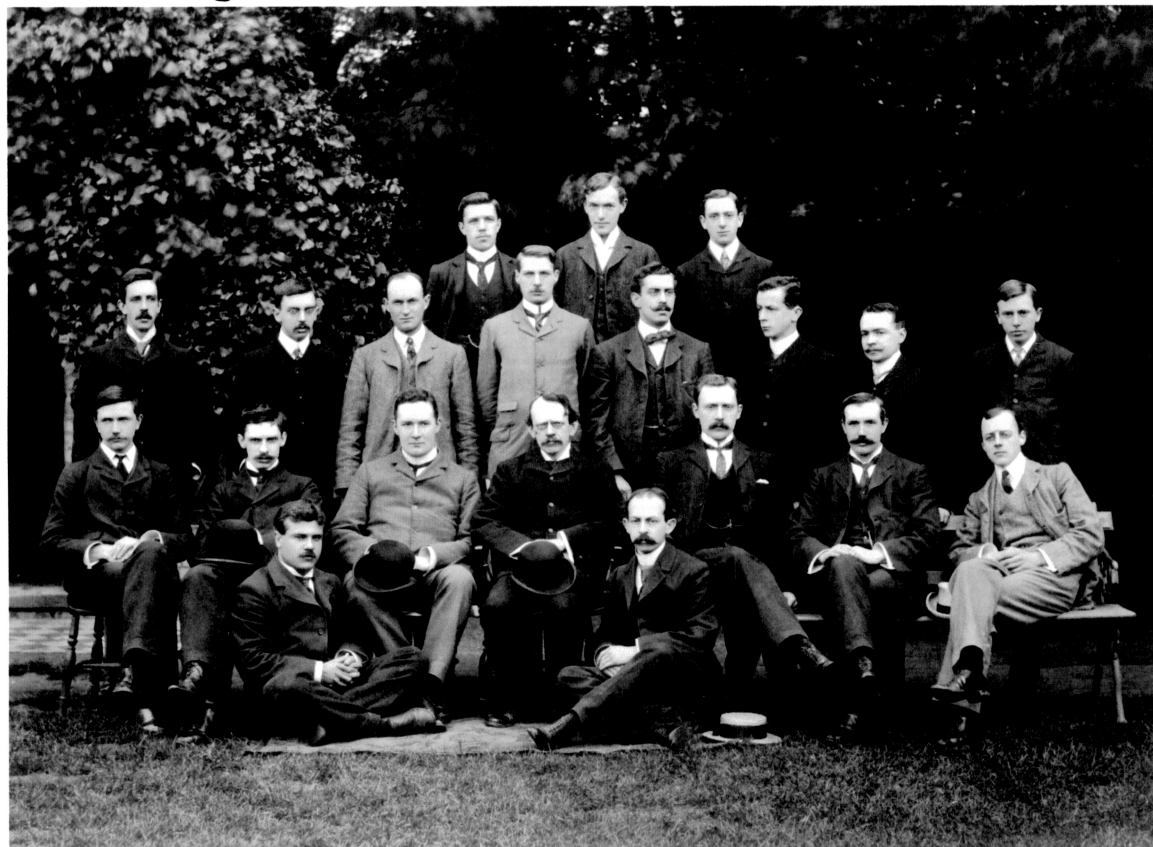

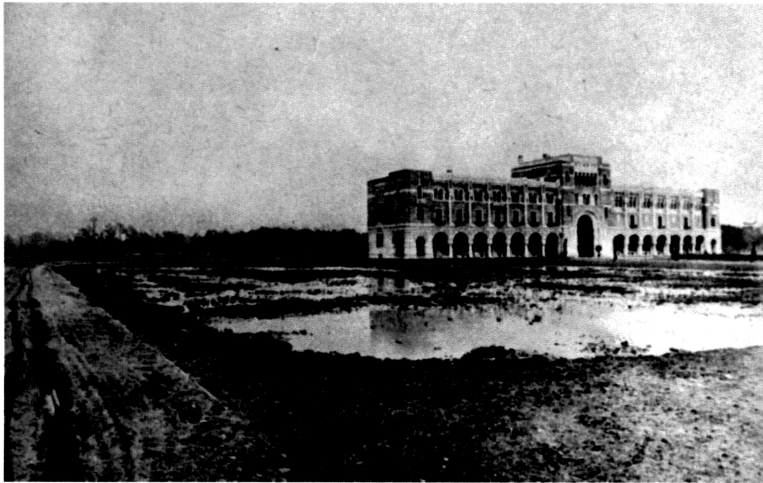

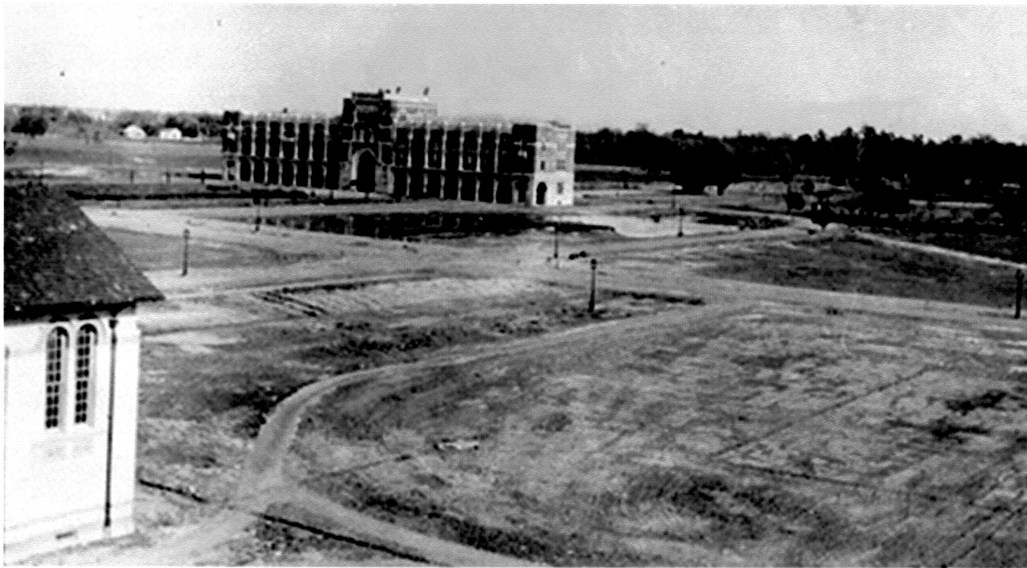

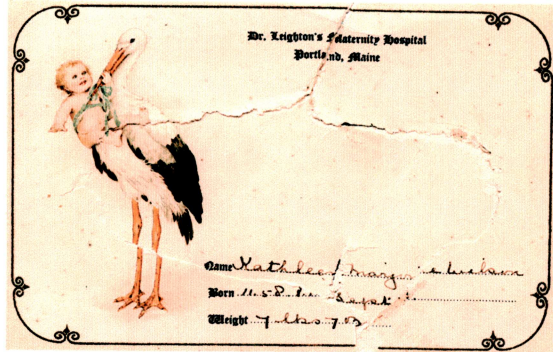

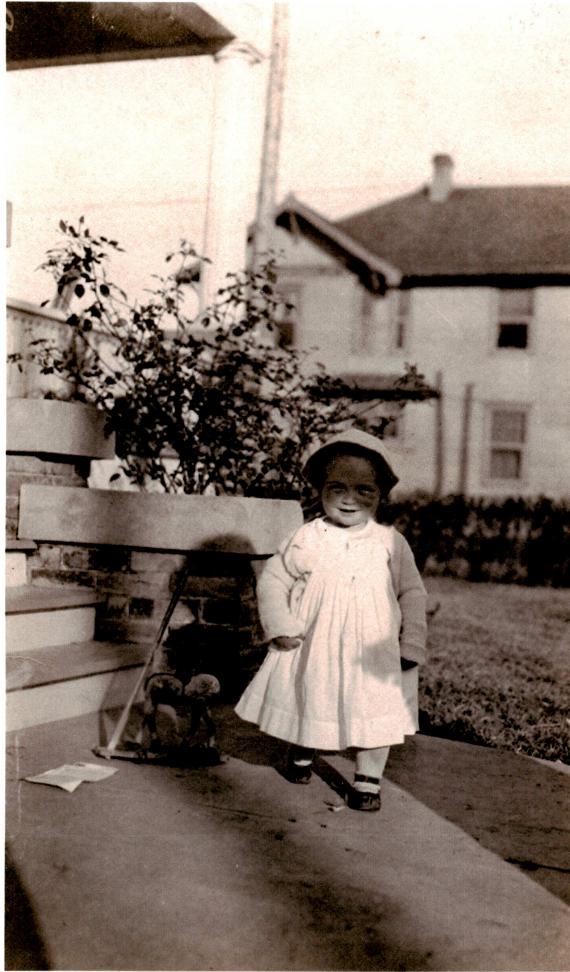

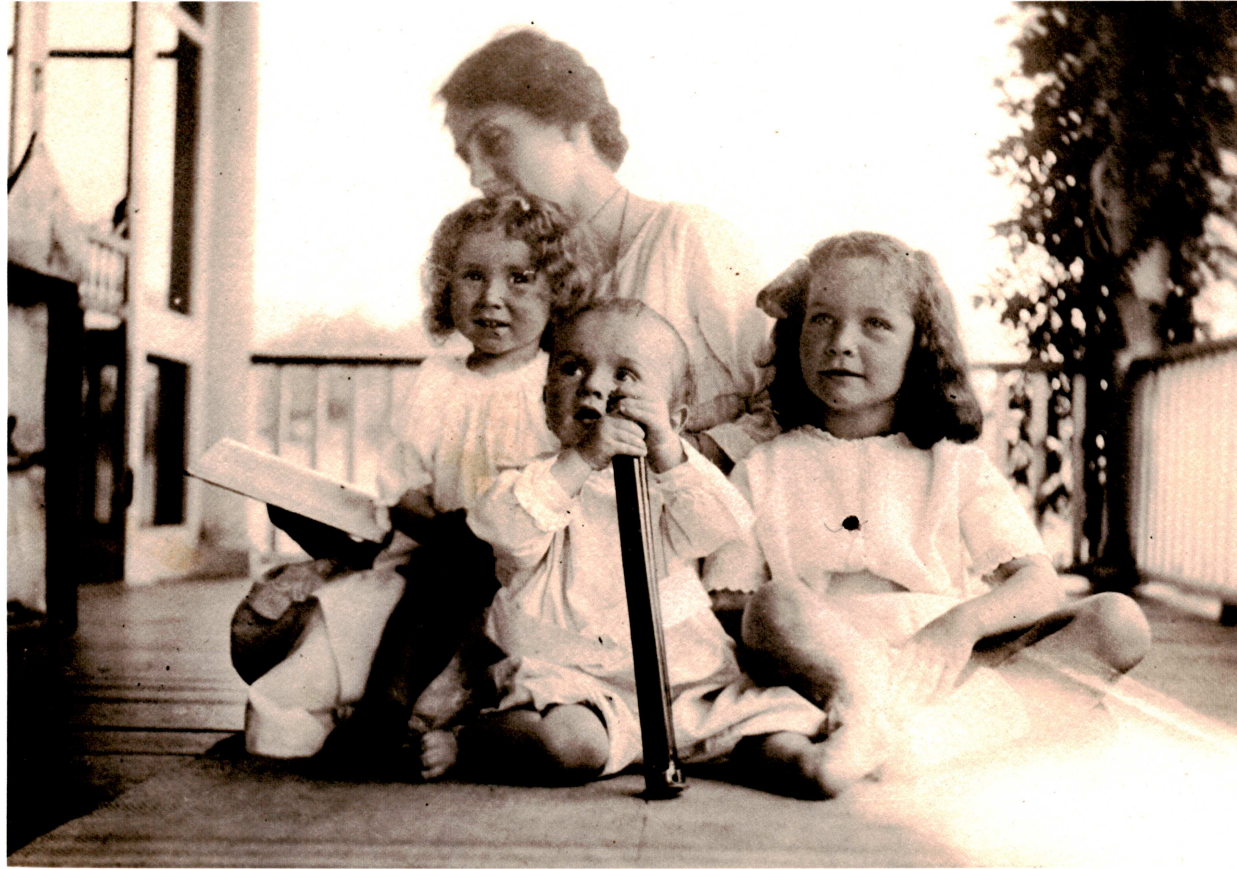

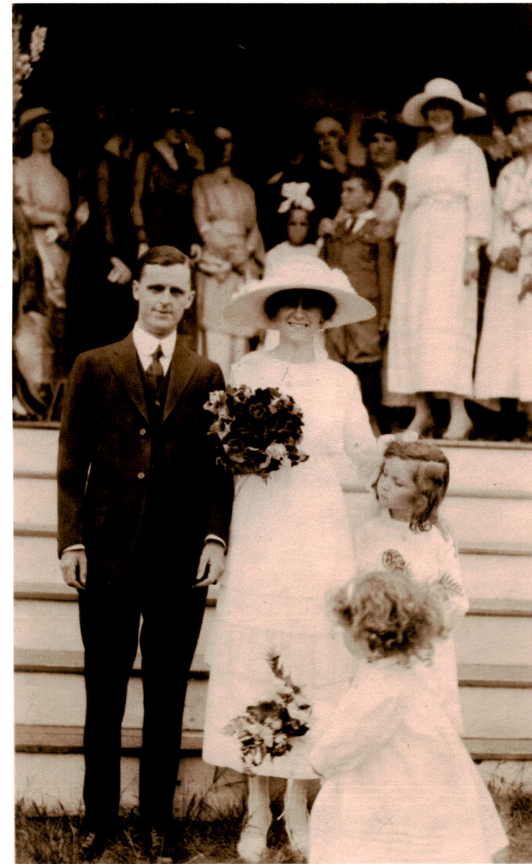

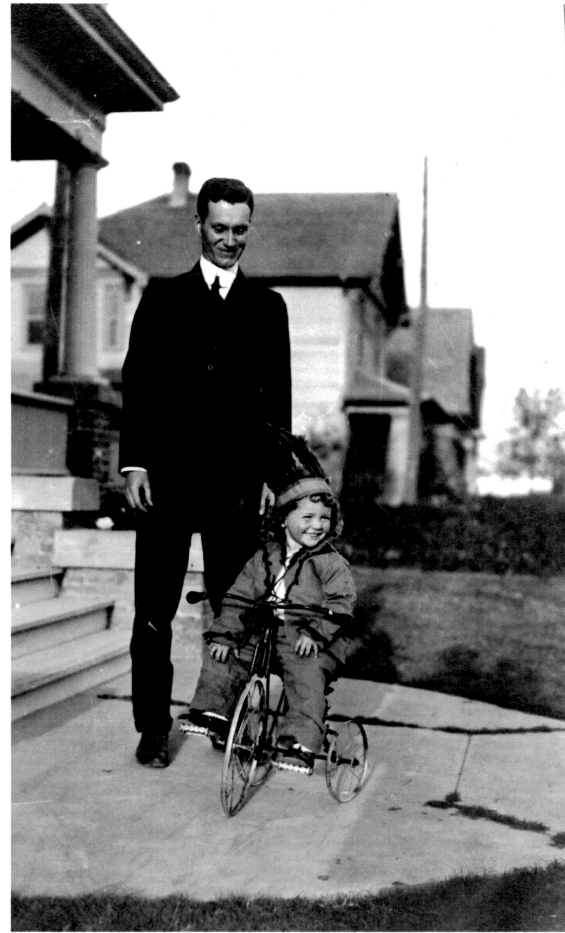

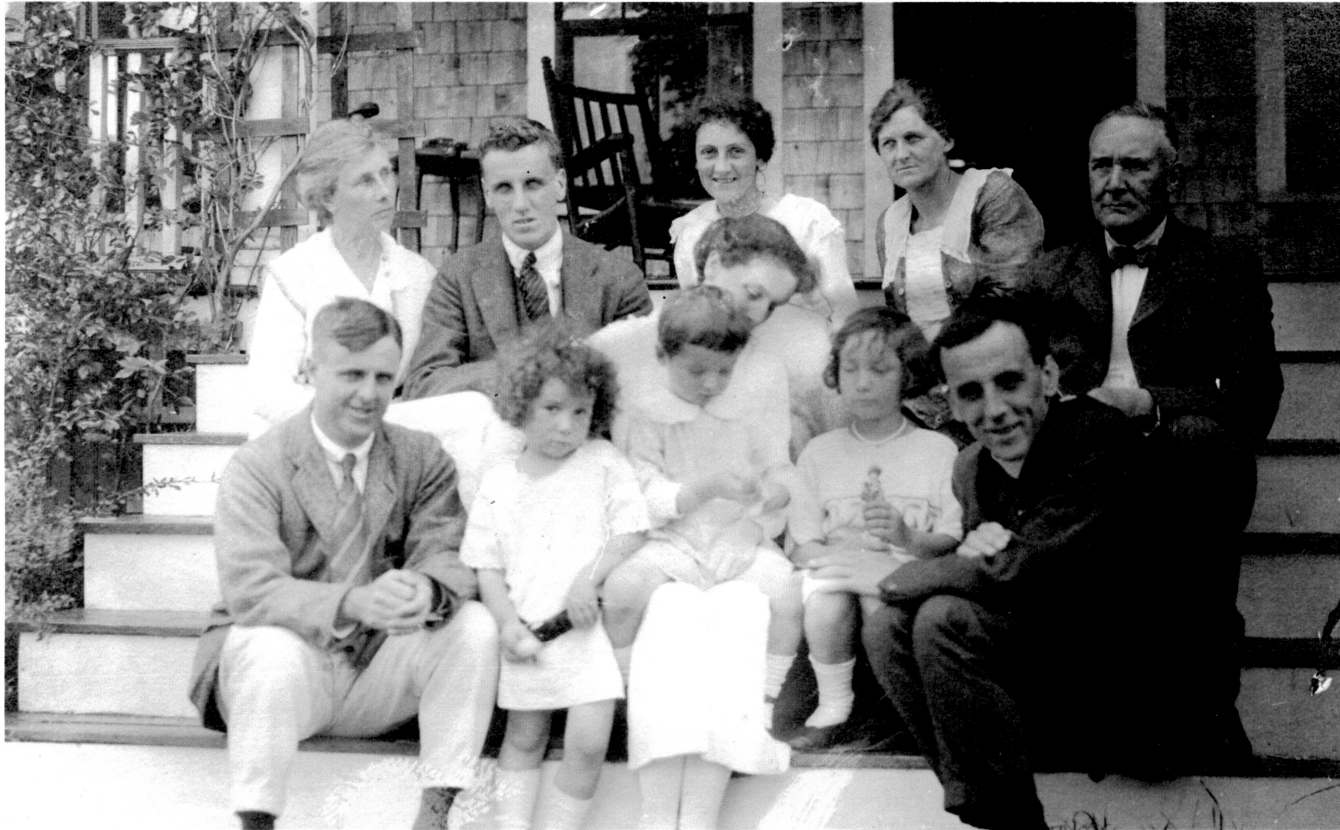

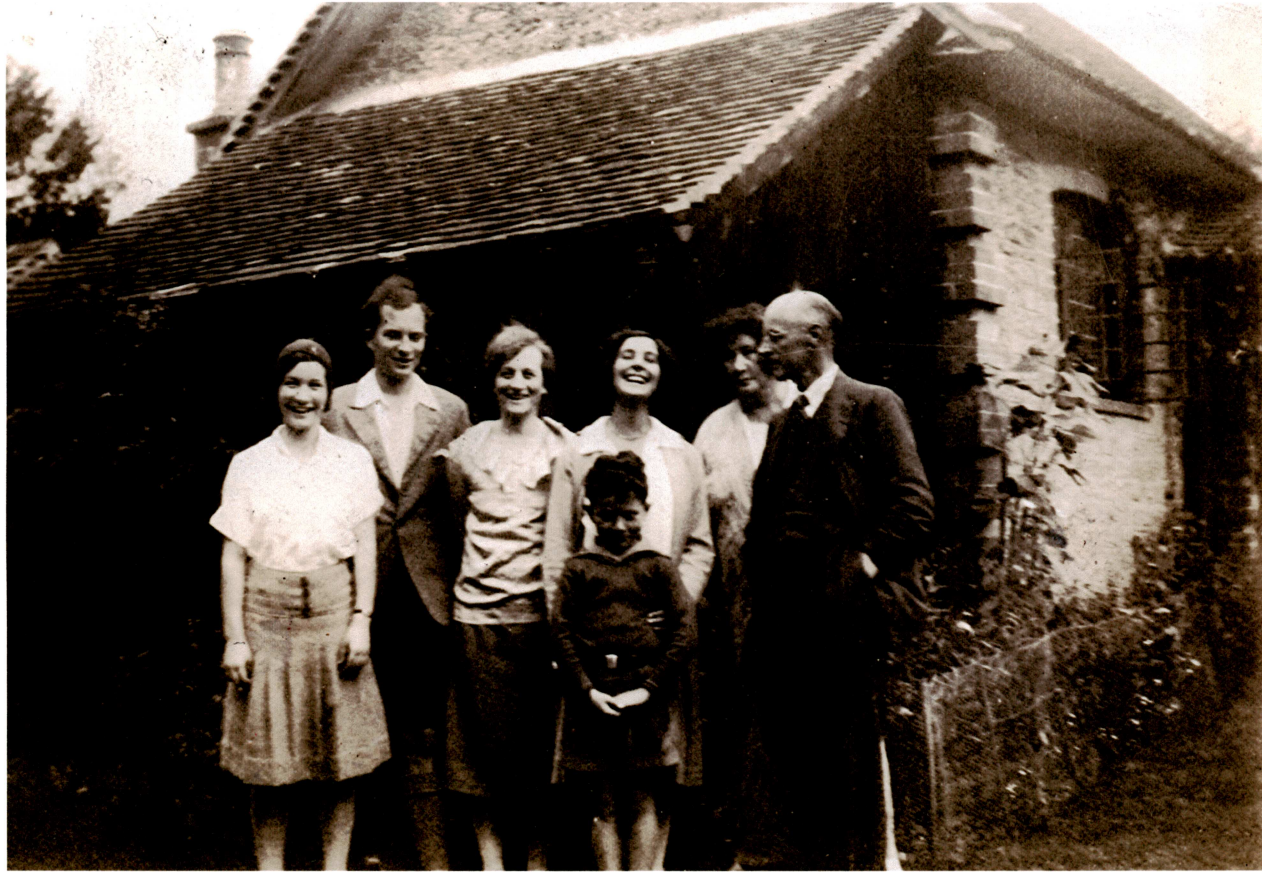

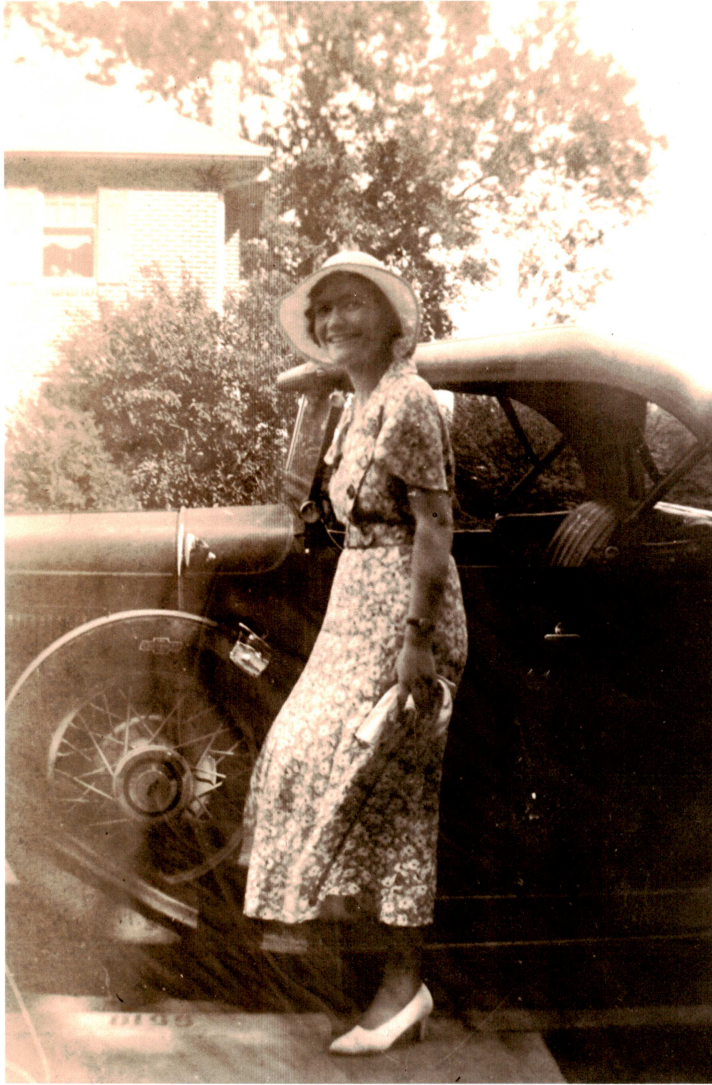

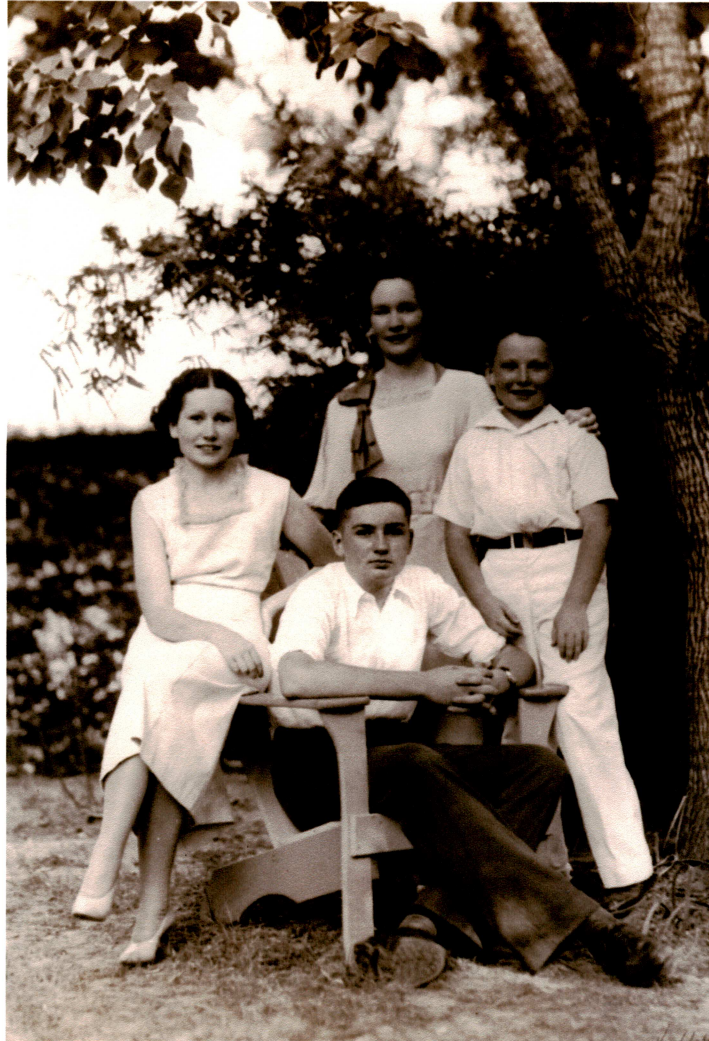
